Wake Up For Lent

Dear friends,

I hope we all long for progress in our spiritual lives. The desire of the Psalmist was to go from strength to strength, and likewise Paul, was to go from glory to glory!

This progress requires a momentum or a power to break through barriers and glass ceilings, so that we can go further and higher for Jesus than ever before. Many of us are looking to a new book, a new thinker, teacher or preacher, or a new philosophy of some kind to enable this progress. But I would suggest that searching in the "new" may be a fruitless pursuit.

In our Pillars of the Church sermon series, we have looked at Acts 2 for some distinctives of the early church and it's been a reminder to me that the basics of Christianity hold the keys to growth in the Kingdom of God. Like a long jumper, in order to propel forward we need to first retreat backwards. Only in doing this retreat, will we have the momentum to truly advance.

One of these pillars is prayer and I want to encourage a lent of seeking God in this way. And I would love you to do what I'm doing and piggy-back on the God-given idea of a clergyman down in Redcross Wicklow - read the following:

"We are all aware of the hopelessness, despair, pain and brokenness we see all around us every day, but God is still passionate for Ireland, and wants to radically transform and save it through His power and love. However, for this to happen, it is so important that Christians throughout this island are committed to praying for the Kingdom of God to come.

Jonah was given a great commission to go to Nineveh but decided it wasn't for him and therefore ran away from the call of God. He ends up in a boat in the middle of a storm, because of his disobedience. The crew are in turmoil, but Jonah is below deck, fast asleep. In Jonah 1:6 it states "The captain went to him and said, 'How can you sleep? Get up and call on your god! Maybe he will take notice of us so that we will not perish.'"

We believe there is a call for the church throughout Ireland to "wake up" and call upon God, so that with His help we can fulfil the Great Commission He has given to us. (Matthew 28:18-20)

This Lent (Starting Wednesday, 26th February) we are encouraging people to set their alarms 15 minutes earlier each morning, to wake up and pray, focusing on the following 3 areas.

- To pray for the local church to wake up to its calling
- To pray for the love of God to reach the lost and broken within our communities
- To pray for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit to awaken the island of Ireland

If 10,000 people take up this 15 minute challenge over the traditional 40 days of Lent; the result would be 100,000 hours of prayer for our nation. What difference could this make?

I just love this! Will you join me in this daily retreat so that God might awaken our souls, our church and the nation?

NEVER MIND THE COVER – READ IT

BIBLES come in all different shapes and sizes and of course in the last few decades the marketing departments of large publishing houses have got involved to such an extent that the choice is almost bewildering.

I've got a camouflaged backed, waterproof ESV (*I held it under the tap and the water just runs off it – amazing*) bought on a whim just in case I found myself in the wilds being tracked by the enemy and needed to read a bit of scripture without being detected... as you do!

Indeed I pictured myself lying in the moss in a sheltered spot on the mountain with the rain pouring down and congratulating myself on being so wise as to buy a waterproof bible. Smugly I would look around and with a self-satisfied grin imagine everyone else wishing they too had bought a waterproof bible!

Women's bibles, men's bibles, journaling bibles, teenage bibles, study bibles, preaching bibles (clearly just for preachers – what's that about?) ... the list is endless and that's before you start listing the various translations and getting into arguments about the most authentic.

You can become like a rabbit in the headlights and end up neither opening nor turning a page!

And I know the emphasis in these various bibles is on the reader and the life questions he or she may ask at different stages of life or the tasks in ministry being pursued, BUT at the end of the day the word of God is the same today, yesterday and tomorrow.

Its enduring power is truly awesome and life-changing. We can dress up the book all we like and tailor some superfluous content to assuage life's challenges but John 3:16 and 17 remain the same whether it's a women's bible or a men's bible and Jesus remains 'the way the truth and the life,' whether the cover's pink or blue.

The important thing is that you read your bible – regularly – that you take time to ponder its truths and wisdom and life-saving, transformative central message – JESUS!

Indeed go further and join one of our bible studies – Wednesday evenings and Friday mornings - and learn a whole lot more with others seeking to consume the word of God. Or join a home group and do the same. We're studying John's Gospel on Friday mornings at 10.30am in the Lounge in Dollingstown and the Parables of Jesus at 7.45pm in the Minor Hall in Magheralin on Wednesdays.

So as we enter Lent let us all commit to reading our bible every day, getting to know the author better as we do and putting into practice what we learn. So, never mind the cover, just read it!

If we do that then we can change the world.

"Do this in remembrance of me."


Remember my tears, Gethsemane's fears;


CAP










SENIORS' MOVIE NIGHT!

THE WAY OF THE CROSS

'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me.' (Luke 9: 23)

These words of Jesus are spoken at a turning point in the gospel. Jesus challenges the disciples about His identity and their commitment to Him: *'who do the crowds say I am?'* (18). It is at this point that He *'resolutely set out for Jerusalem'* (9:51). On our journey through Lent, as we look to events of Good Friday and Easter, what are our priorities as Jesus' disciples to be?

To deny ourselves: this means to saying No to ourselves and Yes to God, as we humbly submit our will to His. Jesus prayed in the Garden of *Gethsemane* *'not My will but Yours be done.'* (Luke 22:42). It means putting Jesus first in everything: our work, family, ambitions, possessions, marriage, finance and future. We will not be guided by self-interest, but by allowing God to show us how to live in His way.

To take up our cross: this reminds us that the disciple is not immune from suffering, as we follow Jesus along the way of the cross. Just as He carried His cross to Golgotha, we cannot avoid experiencing suffering in a fallen world. Every day we are to live in a way that demonstrates to everyone that we have died to ourselves, our selfish ways and ambitions, and seek to live for God. It means breaking old selfish habits and ways of thinking, as we allow God to renew us by His Spirit.


In all of this we cannot lose, because like Jesus, it is only through death that we find God's new life. *'He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain that which he cannot lose.'*


